Eight Cities Enter Negro Southern League

Plans for the Negro Southern League have finally matured and the organization will be operated under a regular schedule beginning April 29 and ending Sept. 6.

This is the information that Fred Caulfield, local negro backer of the Caulfield Ads, brought back from the Montgomery meeting. Eight cities are represented, as follows: New Orleans, Birmingham, Atlanta, Nashville, Montgomery, Knoxville, Pensacola and Jacksonville, Fla. Games will be played every Saturday and Sunday.

The Caulfield Ads which will represent New Orleans in the league, play a series with the Indianapolis negro team Saturday, Sunday and Monday at Heinemann Park.

STEELARM TRIMS MONTGOMERY 3-0

Giants Feature Second Game
With Good Base Running.
Rabbit Foot Absent.

"Steelarm" Dickey was going good yesterday and held Montgomery to three hits and no runs while his mates collected seven safeties off Mason and made them count for a trio of markers. Yesterday's victory gave Knoxville two straight on the series. A single game will be played this afternoon at Booker Washington at 2:30 o'clock.

The Giants outclassed the visitors at every angle of the game, hitting in the benches and running the paths in the most approved form. Montgomery is to be congratulated on having rounded out nine innings without so much as an attempt at hooping.

Knoxville's first marker came in the fourth as the result of one of the prettiest pieces of base running seen at the park this season. Smith went down on an error. He was playing wide off first when Moore laid down a perfect bunt. By the time the play had been completed at first Smith was well round second and hoofing it toward third. The first baseman was caught unawares and in making a snap throw to third overthrew the base and Smith romped home. A second tally came in the same frame when Mackler clean singled, pilfered second and third and came home when Dickey gave the shortstop one that was too hot to field cleanly.

Knoxville's third run was made in the eighth when Moore hit, was sacrificed to second and scored on Hamilton's double.

One thing that enhanced Knoxville's chances was the fact that the Montgomery third baseman had left his rabbit's foot in his street clothes. He made an inexcusable error in fielding a ground ball and realizing what was the trouble he laid his glove carefully on the ground and stepped gingerly over it, meanwhile looking over his left shoulder. This didn't seem to chase the line, however, as he made a second error. This time he tried a new remedy. With the sun over his left shoulder he made several mystic crosses on the ground. Apparently this latter charm worked for he accepted all remaining chances without a bobble.

The teams play a single game today.

KNOXVILLE WINS NEGRO PENNANT

Giants Lead All Other Contenders By Wide Margin—World Series to Be Played.

Compilation of club standings in the Negro Southern league shows that Knoxville is leading all contenders for the pennant by a wide margin.

The season is now practically closed. It is doubtful if the Giants will engage in any more games with league clubs. The thirteen game series with Montgomery will be played, however, but Manager Brooks announces that the fate of the pennant will not hinge on the outcome of this series.

He states that after leading Montgomery, the nearest competitor, throughout the season by a comfortable margin, he does not believe it fair to his club to agree to allow the fate of the pennant to hinge on the outcome of the next thirteen engagements.

A representative of the local club will leave for Chicago this week to arrange for the playing of a negro world series with the Chicago team, winner of the pennant in the Negro National circuit.

This series will be played early in October, and be divided between Knoxville and Chicago.
